## *Which data mining tool do I use?*

### 1. start here:



A quick way to generate summary information. Choice of menus depends on subject matter. Rank states, counties, or districts; Compare categories; find Trends. Contrast judges and prosecutors with others in district, or list cases. Available for all data.

### 2. try this next:



A more sophisticated data access tool that provides a "drill-down" capability. Linked tables show data for increasingly smaller subsets of data. Drill down all the way to the individual record. Available for criminal, civil, and staffing data.

### 3. for specialized tasks:



An advanced and powerful tool for creating your own data slice on a selected subject. Lets you analyze it using tools for detailed analysis similar to those found in Express. Allows access to individual records. Available for criminal, civil, and staffing data.
